

GLASGOW CAN BOAST of a long tradition of radical movements growing from the ranks of ordinary people. People struggling not only to improve their own conditions but that of all working class people.

Glasgow can lay claim to a series of firsts. Besides being the birthplace of the 'European Temperance Movement', the following are just some other firsts that can be added to its roll of honour:

- Birth of the Scottish Labour Movement.
- First effective trade unions formed.
- First trade union papers printed.
- Scottish Co-operative movement first established.
- Scottish Labour Party founded.
- First Trades Council in Scotland.

The Glasgow Green has always been a focal point for the people of Glasgow and a cradle of social movements throughout its history. The following list is but a hint at the history of the Green:

- Through the 1700 and 1800s, the various reform movements.
- Pre-1914, the woman's suffrage movements.
- 1916, rent strikes.
- 1938 anti-fascist move-ments.
- 1971 U.C.S. crisis.
- 1984 miners strike.
- I hope this gives at least some insight into that other Glasgow, the Glasgow that does not always find its story in the mainstream literature about the city, but is the true heart of the City of Glasgow, the city of compassion and vision.

LIVING RENT members demanded Glasgow City Council reverse their U-turn on affordable housing, and won!

Nearly 100 Living Rent members turned out on 27th January to show their support for building social housing in our city.

Back in November, Living Rent members won a review of the implementation of NPF4 - Scottish Government legislation on building affordable housing. Earlier this month, the Council undemocratically tried to sweep this under the carpet by completely removing the review from their agenda.

Living Rent members weren't going to stand for this. We let the Council know that we are watching them, with trade unionists and councillors standing in solidarity with us.

After our show of strength, it took less than 24 hours for GCC to put affordable housing back on its agenda - an important victory for our members.

If implemented, NPF4 would see developments in Glasgow required to include at least 25% affordable housing.

Our action has pushed the Council one step closer to following the legislation and building the social housing that Glasgow so badly needs.

ONE OF THE MANY BROKEN PROMISES of the Labour Government is the betrayal of the WASPI Women (Women Against State Pension Inequality).

The WASPI Campaign is fighting for justice for all women born in the 1950s affected by the changes to the State Pension Age. WASPI is not against equalisation, but does not accept the unfair way the changes to the pension were implemented with inadequate or no notice.

DISOBEDIENCE

The inspiration of the WASPI women is the Suffragettes, and their famous campaign of civil disobedience in the early 20th Century.

We could all learn a lesson from the direct action methods of the Suffragettes, whether that be showing solidarity with Palestine, campaigning for climate action, protesting against homelessness, combating the rising tide of racism, or fighting for justice at work and in our communities.



SUFFRAGETTE CITY

GLASGOW'S EAST END was a hive of suffrage campaigning in the early 1900s, with mass meetings on Glasgow Green and noisy demonstrations outside Duke St Prison, where imprisoned suffragettes were hunger striking.
